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

AND WIDE -GOODBYE

As seven key faculty and staff members from a range of specialties retire in 2024, they take with them, combined, two centuries of experience and institutional memory.

Almost every year, Greensboro College loses a few faculty members and staffers to retirement. It's part of a national trend, as all but a few Baby Boomers, who disproportionately flooded into the education industry decades ago, are now of retirement age.

But the 2024 exodus is the biggest in President Lawrence D. Czarda's 14year tenure, and maybe in the history of Greensboro College. Three faculty members - all from the School of the Arts - and four key staffers have retired in 2024. With them go more than 200 years combined of experience and institutional memory.

The retirements "represent two centuries ... of loyalty, persistence, and exemplary performance in their respective roles that have made GC such a special institution," Czarda says.

Theatre professor Jo Hall, who serves as dean of the School of the Arts, says having to replace three of her school's 11 professors at once engenders a lot of mixed feelings.

"We're gonna miss them like crazy," Hall says of music professors Jane McKinney and Neill Clegg and theatre professor John Saari. "But what I'm really excited about with the new people is how everyone's going to fit together. There's a new energy, and the new people we brought in feel like a really good fit for what they're doing and whom they're working with."

Three commonalities the retirees tend to share are how they got to GC, what they'd like to do in retirement, and what GC has meant to them. That bonding began in most cases even before the retirees came to GC. All joined the

college after direct or indirect invitations from individuals already on the staff.

Clegg joined the music faculty part-time at the invitation of McKinney, whom he knew through UNC Greensboro and who was then new herself. He went full-time when McKinney suffered a serious illness a couple of years later. Others, like Calvin Gilmore, Director of Campus Safety and Security, and Athletic Director Kim Strable, were invited to apply by people with connections to the college but weren't hiring people themselves.

The sister of Director of Conferences and Events Elaine Kitchell had a friend

at GC who passed on the word of the Conferences and Events opening to her, but Kitchell herself knew no one at the college before meeting then-Chief Operations Officer Robin Daniel, for whom she would work until Daniel's retirement in 2020.

"We just hit it off great," she says. "I thought, 'This would be a fun guy to work with,' and fortunately he felt the same way and hired me."

Gilmore joined GC in 1982 at the suggestion of a housekeeping staffer.

Perhaps his job was less exciting on a typical day than that of a beat cop, but for Gilmore, the people of GC more than made up for that.

"(I love) the relationships with students, faculty, and staff on campus," he says. "I've always felt love from them, and each time I wake up to come here it's always a pleasant experience."

That experience even led him to marry his wife on campus in 1986, with GC students singing during the ceremony. And he will leave a tangible piece of himself behind: The campus security office has been named after him.

The newcomers learned early that because of GC's small size and staff, a pitch-in, can-do attitude was essential. As at most small, private colleges, Greensboro College's finances are driven by enrollment, and most of the retirees recall helping boost enrollment, even when it wasn't in their job descriptions.

For example, McKinney traveled the East Coast extensively to recruit music students. Strable, during his first stint as athletic director from 1989 to 2009, increased enrollment by adding sports,

taking GC from eight intercollegiate sports to 16 in about seven years.

A trustee asked him then about the enrollment implications of adding sports. "We had 25 young men on the (lacrosse) roster," Strable told him, "and I guarantee you that 25 out of 25 would not be here if we didn't have lacrosse."

But all the retirees say that making a difference in students' lives was the most important thing they did and the best part of the job.

"(I enjoyed) working with good people, and I had good relationships with faculty, but the students, of course, have been a hoot," Saari says.

Several retirees also mentioned the loyalty they have felt from the college, which they in turn feel toward it. Gilmore and Saari say they turned down multiple offers to work elsewhere. And Strable, who was laid off in 2009 during a financial crisis, had no qualms about returning, at Czarda's invitation, nine years later.

Kitchell, who had completed three years of college years ago while living in California, even finished her degree at GC. Taking the limit for employees of one class per semester, she graduated in 2020 and was named the most outstanding graduating adult undergraduate student.

With that kind of loyalty, it is no surprise that most of this year's retirees stayed at GC well past the traditional retirement age of 65. And a common theme runs through their reasons for leaving this year: It's time.

Saari cites the good shape in which he is leaving the theatre/tech concentration.

Clegg cites a desire to write a memoir and travel with his wife, Victoria, a former GC staffer. And Kitchell says, simply, "It's time to do the next thing."

The retirees all say they'd like to travel. Clegg and McKinney will remain working musicians with active performance schedules (McKinney also directs). "I wanted to retire when I'm still able to do things," McKinney says. "It's time for me to step out and let someone else take over the music education part."

Gilmore wants to do more mission and service work through his church. All want to read more ("I've got a big list," Saari says). Kitchell, who says she has wanted to be a teacher since fifth grade, plans to work as a substitute teacher in the Guilford County Schools system.

As the retirees sit back, they can, and do, take pride in what they have accomplished for students and the college.

McKinney, Clegg, and Saari, the faculty members, take pride in how they have helped shape theatre and music students for rewarding professional careers in their fields, with some students achieving national prominence.

Strable talks about overcoming big obstacles – small team rosters and a lack of facilities – for athletics when he arrived

at GC in 1989 so that he could expand and enhance the college's athletics.

"I tried to make a difference in people's lives, knowing that I was on an important mission to protect them and just be there for them," Gilmore says.

Kitchell says she is proud of having worked with and served students: "(They) fill my life with youth and excitement and hope, and it has been really wonderful getting to know them." And that comprehensive attitude of service has imbued these retirees' tenures at GC with meaning, Czarda says.

"We all recognize and celebrate the long and dedicated service of those who have committed many years, even many decades, to the mission of Greensboro College," he says. "We will miss each of them and all of them but are confident that their successors will be able to meet the challenge of continuing the legacy of the college in our 186th year."

AS THE RETIREES SIT BACK, THEY CAN, AND DO, TAKE PRIDE IN WHAT THEY HAVE ACCOMPLISHED FOR STUDENTS AND THE COLLEGE.





Before the 2023-2024 academic year, the overall grand prize of the North Carolina Campus Engagement's Collegiate Hunger Challenge, a higher-education initiative to address food insecurity on college campuses and in their communities, had only been won by public universities.

With larger populations — which could, theoretically, draw greater participation from their campuses — the previous winners of the NC College Hunger Challenge's overall grand prize, which goes back to 2018, had been UNC Charlotte, East Carolina University, and Elizabeth City State University.

But, as with many things about Greensboro College, the school broke the mold. Thanks to teamwork, hard work, and a lot of social media posts (part of the competition included a social-media bonus), the school won the \$10,000 NC Hunger Challenge in January.

Greensboro College was previously a regular partner with NC Campus Engagement, and after reconnecting over the past year, it has made a large splash in just its first year back together.

Tyler Smith '22 has also been instrumental in the success of the NC Hunger Challenge and GC's Pride Pantry.

"It was a surreal feeling. We already knew that we were among the top contenders to win the challenge, and we thought that there was no way for us to lose," said student Xypher Pino '26. "Though, when we officially got the email that we did win, it was still such an amazing feeling and so satisfying to see our hard work paid off."

Pino, a biology major from Clemmons who minors in chemistry, psychology, and humanities, and Luke Butner '26, a biology and religion double major from Kernersville who is minoring in humanities, were the two student ambassadors of the challenge at Greensboro College. As ambassadors, they led the effort on campus and its programs and events.

"It is a great joy to work with Xypher and Luke. They are full of energy, creativity, and drive to compete in this challenge," said the Rev. Dr. Robert Brewer, who served as the faculty/staff advisor and mentor for the group. "I am so proud of them, and they give me hope for our world and make it a joy to come to work each day. If we had more people like Xypher and Luke in the world, we would have a better place to live for all people."

Throughout the challenge, Pino, Butner, and Brewer were joined in their efforts by Tyler Smith '22 as the team's civic engagement manager. Smith is a graduate student at Wake Forest University's School of Divinity and a residence hall director at GC. Through their efforts, the foursome raised awareness about food insecurity and created activities for guests to engage with during the Fall 2023 semester.

These events included a food drive on campus and at a local Food Lion grocery store in Greensboro; a lunch-and-learn presentation on campus; a dance celebration, which required two canned goods for entry, for students at the end of the Fall 2023 semester; and other programming.

One of these events was the "Souper Bowl" Food Drive during the Greensboro College-Methodist University football game.

During this event, Pino, Butner, Brewer, and Smith were joined by the Department of Athletics, which had been participating in its own food drive with its peers of the USA South Athletic Conference. By the end of the day, Greensboro College had collected 1,549 items. In total, for the Fall 2023 semester, the GC Hunger Challenge Team collected more than 3,000 products, 1,321.71 pounds.

"One moment that stood out to me was when we were logging food data into our system," said Butner. "It stood out to me in particular because of the sheer amount of food which we had to process. We had a good time, and it was amazing to see how much food we had collected."

The grand prize was given to Greensboro College at the February PACE Conference, where Brewer was also chosen as the 2024 NCEE Civic Engagement Professional of the Year.

The prize has gone towards improving campus kitchens, the community garden, and the Pride Pantry on campus, which features lockers on campus where students can anonymously pick up non-perishable food and hygiene products.



Through the Fall 2024 semester, the team has been helping those who have been food insecure on campus. Through the first half of the academic year, the GC Hunger Team had hosted another food drive and held creative programs and activities to raise awareness of food insecurity.

Xypher and Luke first came together during the 2022-2023 academic year to work on food drives around campus. And two years later, not only have their efforts been recognized as award-winning, but more importantly, they have continued to help their classmates and campus.

"I think the most rewarding aspect about participating in the hunger challenge has been seeing all of the people on campus that we have positively impacted," said Pino. "I have had so many people come up to me and tell me how much they use the Pride Pantries and how helpful it has been for them."

"I've learned personally that even the smallest amount of effort can have large effects," said Butner. "We're seeing huge results from just the efforts of a few individuals. So, I believe if someone can be involved just a little bit, the results of their efforts will add up exponentially." 10 Points of Pride www.greensboro.edu Points of Pride 11

GOVERNOR'S SCHOOL WEST FINDS A NEW HOME AT GREENSBORO COLLEGE

the summer of 2024, for the first time,
Greensboro College hosted
Governor's School West, a summer enrichment program offered by the N.C. Department of Public Instruction to about 400 of the state's most promising high-school students.

By all accounts, it was a smash hit — for the Governor's School and the college.

Both sides were thrilled enough by how well the program went at GC that near the end of the session, with N.C. Gov. Roy Cooper in attendance, President Lawrence D. Czarda, Ph.D., was able to announce that GC will host Governor's School West annually for the foreseeable future.

That means not only additional revenue for the college during the lean summer months, but also a chance to get a sneak peek at some of the best and brightest North Carolina high-schoolers and the opportunity to sell them — or, through them, perhaps some of their friends — on Greensboro College as a college destination.

The Governor's School of North Carolina, the first program of its kind in the country, has offered summer enrichment to hundreds of North Carolina's most promising high-school students annually since 1963.

For its first 15 years, it was held in a single location, housing about 400 students. Since 1978, it has been held in two locations, GS West and GS East, each housing about 400 students and both offering the same curriculum.

That curriculum includes three parts: Area I, the academic subject for which students are nominated — e.g., English, math, or instrumental music; Area II, epistemology, the nature of knowledge; and Area III: Self and Society. The curriculum is augmented by evening activities, many of which were held on GC's front campus.

GS East has been housed at Meredith College since 2000. In recent years, GS West has moved a couple of times, and onsite director Bob Davis had been looking for a permanent home for the program.

Enter Martha Bradberry '74, chair of Greensboro College's Board of Trustees, who knew Davis through a group of people she knows in Burlington.

"A couple of years ago, (Davis) was packing up to move (GS West) to Winston-Salem State University," she recalls. "The thought just popped into my head: 'If y'all ever want to move again, think about Greensboro College.' And then I thought nothing more about it."

Davis, though, apparently thought about it quite a bit: "He called me around the holidays" in 2023, Bradberry says. College officials, including Czarda, met with Governor's School officials, who toured the campus in December while students were home for the semester break.

While Davis knew of Greensboro College through his connection with Bradberry, Rodney Allen did not. Allen is coordinator of the N.C. Department of Public Instruction's Office of Advanced Learning and Gifted Education. In that role, he oversees both GS West and GS East.

He liked what he saw at GC.

"A number of people, including Dr. Czarda, were enthusiastic and had the vision to move quickly," he says.

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After a day of classes, students at the North Carolina Governor's School West relaxed and gathered during a sunset in front of Main Building.

After a day of class, two students at the North Carolina Governor's School leap skyward in sync to catch a football on back campus.

One of them was Elaine Kitchell, the outgoing Director of Conferences and Events. Although she was planning to retire, Kitchell stayed through the Governor's School West session, which ended in late July, to ensure that everything ran smoothly.

The Governor's School of North Carolina, the first program of its kind in the country, has offered summer enrichment to hundreds of North Carolina's most promising high-school students annually since 1963.

And it did, starting from move-in day — "We had the smoothest move-in day we've ever had,"
Davis says — until closing. "It was a match made in heaven."

"I have yet to see anyone who's not thrilled to be here," Allen agrees.

Near the end of the session, Cooper, the governor, visited campus. And during an assembly in the Gail Brower Huggins Performance Center that day, with the governor and the chair of the N.C. State Board of Education present, President Czarda announced that the administrations of the Governor's School and the college have agreed that GC will be the home of Governor's School West for the foreseeable future.

"This has been a mutually rewarding first step in what should be a long-term partnership," Czarda says. He adds that the session "went exceptionally well from both the perspectives of the college and the Department of Public Instruction. The daily energy and academic stimulation on campus were palpable, and the interactions between Governor's School West faculty, staff, officials, and students, and the faculty, staff, and administration at GC was excellent."

Bradberry, the trustees' chair who helped start the initiative, pronounced herself pleased at the outcome.

"This was a wonderful opportunity for GC to have 400 of the best and brightest students in the state on our campus for a month," she says.

The college couldn't mount a full-court-press recruiting pitch. But Randy Doss, the vice president for enrollment, organized workshops for GS students in how to apply to college and how to write better essays.

"We hope some will take a look at us, but even if we don't (recruit any GS students), this is a good way to get the word about GC out through their friends," Bradberry says. "We love hosting it just to have some kids on campus, but we hope this will make GC a destination for these kids or some of their friends."

But TESOL professors Michelle Plaisance and Paula Wilder M.A. '13 made it through — a 12-day, nine-city rail tour of Vietnam. Along the way, they worked at every stop with Vietnamese teachers of English and students to assess needs for developing English-teaching curricula for Vietnam's Ministry of Education.

Vietnam was to conduct an in-depth needs analysis for the course creation

Some days their train trips were 16 hours. And the tour fell not just during warm weather, but also during the hottest heat wave in Vietnam's recorded history, Plaisance recalls: "We taught in one classroom where it was 112 Fahrenheit with no air conditioning."

They were accompanied by officials from the U.S. Embassy in Vietnam, who were filming a documentary of their work.

As *Points of Pride* went to press, the documentary had not yet been released.

The embassy was involved because Plaisance and Wilder's effort is part of the U.S. State Department's prestigious English Language Specialist Program, which, since 1991, has sought to improve the way English is taught abroad and foster good international relations through cultural exchange. Plaisance and Wilder's eight-month project is one of about 250 in more than 80 countries that the State Department program supports each year.

The program selected them based on a match between program needs and their areas of specialty. Plaisance is a professor of English and Teaching English to Speakers of Other Languages (TESOL), Dean of the School of Humanities, and Director of Graduate Studies in TESOL at Greensboro College. Wilder is the college's Director of International Programs and an instructor of graduate students in the TESOL program.

Their specific program was developed in consultation with Vietnam's Ministry of Education and the State Department. The goal was to develop a program for the Ministry to use to teach English to Vietnamese students.

To start, Plaisance and Wilder had to assess needs, which is how they ended up on the rail tour. That tour let them meet with 25 to 50 students — various kinds of learners — at each stop. They started at Lao Cai on the Chinese border and proceeded south.

The English Language Specialist Program, in which Dr. Michelle Plaisance and Professor Paula Wilder (pictured speaking) are participants, is the premier opportunity for leaders in the field of teaching English to speakers of other languages (TESOL) to enact meaningful and sustainable changes in the way that English is taught abroad.


"The language skills of the teachers were impressive, especially since most of the teachers we worked with had never traveled to the U.S. or any other English-speaking country," Wilder says. "They were open to new ideas, shared what they were already using in their classroom to make learning more

accessible to their students, and were eager to learn about different activities to use in their classrooms."

She adds: "The people of Vietnam that we encountered on the train journey and in the cities that we visited were warm and welcoming. (It made), the www.greensboro.edu Points of Pride 17

whole experience very positive and enlightening."

The tour wrapped up in Ho Chi Minh City (formerly Saigon). Plaisance and Wilder finished their work there on April 28, which is celebrated as the Reunification Day holiday in Vietnam.

The country had been divided at the 17th parallel into the Communist North and the democratic South from the end of World War II until the Vietnam War ended with reunification on April 28, 1975. Nowadays, the United States, which fought against North Vietnam during the war, and the reunited Vietnam are cultural and trading partners.

"We celebrated our presence in Vietnam as a positive," Plaisance says. "We watched fireworks. It was great." Back in the U.S., Plaisance and Wilder created a 12-module online course on differentiated instruction for learners of English. The completed course — the deadline was Nov. 1 — will become part of Vietnam's official English curriculum through the Ministry of Education. "We will have left our durable mark on Vietnam's education," Plaisance says.

To Plaisance and Wilder, that will have made the grueling trip worth it. And it was grueling. In Vietnam, rail "luxury accommodations" meant four bunks to a compartment.

"We had to dress in professional teacher gear for the workshops, but we couldn't ride the train in that," Plaisance says. "We didn't have time to do laundry," Wilder adds. "For example, we would get to the hotel at 6 p.m. and leave at 6 a.m."

"But we saw the whole country," Plaisance says.

Plaisance's work is done. But Wilder has signed on with the State Department for an additional 12 months of attending conferences, talking about the English Language Specialist Program, and recruiting additional participants. She was among only 10 people selected as an Alumni Ambassador for 2024-2025.

And the two are scheduled to return to Vietnam in July 2025 for follow-up workshops.

During the 2023-2024 academic year, the President's Commission on Inclusive Excellence (PCIE) completed its first full year at Greensboro College, acting on 11 different initiatives aimed at ensuring that all students, faculty and staff feel welcomed and included.

But more work is still required, says the commission chair, Dr. Juliet Lowery.

"In my first meeting with President Czarda, he said, 'We have good people at Greensboro College. The issue is, how do we move forward?' If we have good intentions but do not act on them, we are seen as not caring," said Lowery, who is also the director of diversity, equity, and inclusion at the college.

"We are making progress and continue to keep campus abreast of what we are doing," she added. "PCIE is the driving force behind Inclusive Excellence, but it is every campus member doing their part to practice and embed the principles into our GC community."

The 11 projects on which the commission has acted during the

- Main Building Center. The space had been named after Solomon Lea, the first president of Greensboro College. But the space was renamed after members of the history department found that Lea had owned enslaved African Americans.
- Holding critical campus conversations regarding the history of Solomon Lea and the Israel-Hamas War.
- Expanding the Martin Luther King Jr. Day event by partnering with UNC Greensboro, Guilford College, Guilford Technical Community College, and North Carolina A&T State University to put on an annual, largescale event.
- Adding a course in American Sign Language (ASL).
- Adding three new minors: African American Studies, International Studies, and LGBTQ Studies.
- Revamping the bias-incident reporting form and process to ensure that anyone who experiences conduct, speech, or expression motivated, in whole or in part, by bias or prejudice can receive support and other resources.
- Inviting a guest pastor, the Rev. Dr. Cyntha Hale, to speak on the subject, "In 2024, What Would Dr. King Do?"
- Holding a book read and author conversation centered on the text, "From Equity Talk to Equity Walk," by
- Creating a faculty and staff survey to assess what GC is doing well and/or what areas it needs to improve to create a work environment where people feel they are seen, heard, and valued and feel a sense of belonging. The survey was scheduled to begin in October.
- Offering training for faculty, staff, and students in building inclusive communities and nonviolent communication. The training was facilitated by the nonprofit group North Carolina Community and Justice and UNC Greensboro's Safe Zone, as well as other agencies.
- · Holding an International Women's Day event with Lilie Bekele-Piper.

PCIE as a concept at the college goes back to 2020.

After several homicides of unarmed Black people by white police officers, including the murder of George Floyd at the hands of several Minneapolis police officers, during the summer of 2020, Greensboro College invited Dr. Cherrel Dyce to analyze and report on the status of diversity, equity, and inclusion at the college.



Students and staff from Greensboro College, UNCG, N.C. A&T, Guilford College, and Guilford Technical Community College (GTCC) teamed up to present the 12th annual Martin Luther King. Jr. Celebration in January. The theme was "Dream it. Believe it. Do it. Developing Leaders for Tomorrow." The event included discussions about activism today.

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Dyce is an associate professor of education at Elon University, executive director of diversity, equity, and inclusion at Elon's Williams School for Education, and a race scholar, motivational leader and speaker. She recommended the initiative that would become PCIE.

Made up of faculty and staff members across different departments, as well as four students, the commission was divided into five subcommittees focusing on:

- Access and Success
- Campus climate and intergroup relations
- Community and partnerships
- Academics
- · Infrastructure.

The group serves as the advisory board and recommending body to the President on advancing diversity, equity, and inclusion at GC. Members of the organization act as liaisons to their departments and areas of interest across the campus.

As the commission entered another school year this fall, the organization has remained committed and active in its work towards inclusive excellence. Inclusive excellence is a framework designed to integrate diversity, equity, and educational quality efforts into institutional missions.

Throughout the Fall 2024 semester, the commission has worked to build and sustain a climate and culture that invites diverse thought to guide innovation in teaching, research, discovery, and accountability beyond the borders of the college.

A high point was the opportunity for students to volunteer with Guilford County Special Olympics, which came to campus in September and October.

"Our goal," Lowery said, "is to continue to examine our policies and practices to ensure they align with the vision of the strategic plan and inclusive excellence."

Similar efforts have met with pushback in both the business sector and in some public universities. But Lowery says that GC's effort has been largely accepted, at least partly because the effort's focus is encapsulated in the college mission statement's emphasis on Methodist values of inclusivity.

"When you examine our current strategic plan," she says, "you will find that the policies and practices we uplift are part of the fabric of our institution."

GC'S DR. NATASHA VEALE'S NEW BOOK offers advice on retaining special-education teachers

special education is a growing field, and 46 out of 50 states report shortages of special-education teachers. The global pandemic made the shortage even worse. And yet, Dr. Natasha Veale found in her research in North Carolina, special-education teachers — including some in the licensure program she leads — say they are leaving the field because they're not getting support from their administrations.

Veale, a special-education teacher herself and dean of the School of Social Sciences and Education, conducted in-depth interviews with building-level administrators — primarily school principals — in 11 North Carolina public-school districts.

From what she learned, combined with her other recent research and with her experiences as a specialeducation teacher and professor of special education, Veale arrived at steps administrators can take to retain specialed teachers. Her findings are relevant to North Carolina and, she believes, to retaining specialed teachers nationally.

She has compiled her findings in a book, "How to Retain Special Education Teachers: A Transformational Leadership Guide for School Administrators," which Myers Education Press of Gorham, Maine, will publish in February.

The book is targeted, she says, at school administrators who hire and oversee special-ed teachers, to help them support and retain those teachers.

"Teachers in my licensure program started to share their feelings of despair and desire to quit teaching because of a lack of administrative support," she says. "I decided to shift my focus to principals to find out their experiences with leading special-education teachers. This was a new conversation for the principals I interviewed. So, when I was asked to author a book to extend my research, I was happy to do so."

She says she met some resistance from principals to discussing the topic, but that most eventually opened up.

"(I) was enlightened to find out that principals in my study said no one had ever asked them how they felt about the challenges they faced when trying to lead their special education teachers," she says. "I was happy to be the one to give them an opportunity to share and get the word out about their struggles."

She hopes that sharing those principals' insights with their peers will empower them to empower special-ed teachers and improve their working conditions: "This book will guide them through ways they can successfully implement the changes needed."

She adds: "I hope my book will inspire principals and assistant principals to build their self-efficacy as leaders in special education, build relationships with their special-education teachers, and understand how to effectively support their teachers' workload.

"I also want to help administrator preparation programs strengthen their programs to include more special-education content to better prepare future administrators to work with their special-education teachers."



CHARITABLE GIVING 2023-2024

Greensboro College's donors once again made GC a priority in their charitable giving. We thank you for the tremendous impact you have made on every student, in each classroom, on athletic

fields and stages, in residence halls, and on our beautiful campus.

You gave a total of \$1,585,641.

\$1,462,717 in Unrestricted Funds for Operations

One of our annual fund goals is to continue to grow the GC Fund, which supports operations. The total donations to that fund of \$314,956 surpassed the goal of \$300,000 and were an increase of \$10,000 over last year. One reason for the success of the GC Fund campaign was the Trustee Challenge. Trustees committed to match up to \$40,000 in new and increased gifts to the GC Fund made between July 1 and December 31; \$86,273 from 221 donors helped achieve the \$40,000 match!

Another **\$630,668** was given without restrictions so that it could be used to support operations. Operational expenses include student financial aid, faculty-staff salaries, educational expenses, arts and athletics, campus grounds and facilities, utilities and maintenance, and more.

Restricted Gifts for Operations

Another **\$522,392** was given for specific operational purposes. Of that total, \$375,219 was given to support student scholarships. This includes a very significant scholarship grant of \$230,000 from the Lettie Pate Whitehead Foundation.

Endowment/Permanent Assets

\$116,751 in gifts was added to GC's permanent endowment; of that total, more than \$96,000 was given for scholarship endowments.

Planned Estate Gifts

The Peter Doub Society recognizes donors who have made provisions for the college through their estate plans. GC received \$346,040 from the estates of alumni or their family members.

EVE HOOVER '59, PH.D., MAKES SIX-FIGURE ENDOWMENT GIFT TO HONOR HER **CLASSMATES**

Eve Hoover, Ph.D., isn't your typical major alumni donor. Her inspiration to establish a \$100,000 scholarship endowment is largely to honor her Greensboro College classmate friends from the Class of 1959: Harriet Craver Heath, Martha "Parkie" Parsons, and twin sisters Martha Yarborough Stevenson and Mary Yarborough Crittenden.

"My dad offered me enough college tuition for four years of Greensboro College or two years of Duke University, with the rest left up to me to pay for," she recalls. "GC wasn't my first choice, but the affordable choice for me then. I didn't enjoy my time there, but I made good friends."

Harriet, Parkie, Martha, Mary, and Eve formed a friendship that helped them through four years and lasted a lifetime.

Eve graduated with a bachelor's degree in history from GC, followed by a master's from UNCG and a Ph.D. from UNC-Chapel Hill. Her graduate degrees in counseling led to a career in human resources and upper management of medical practices in California.

When it was time to retire, Eve was lured by her love for her native North Carolina mountains, so she settled in retirement to Hendersonville.

Now, 65 years after graduation, Eve has established a permanent endowment fund, the earnings from which will fund partial tuition for a GC student with a preference for a music major in voice. "I'm not sure any of us were actually music majors," adds Eve, "but my friends who sang in E.L. Williams's Glee Club had the best time of us all."
